3rd SUNDAY OF EASTER

In this Easter season of great gladness, we listen carefully to the stories of our risen Lord. Each one helps us to see how his presence gives us courage and new hope.

"Jesus said to him 'Feed my sheep'". The rest of the world has settled back to normal after the Easter holidays, but we continue to dwell on the resurrection of Jesus and the growth of the Church. Today's Gospel, which many people consider the most beautiful of the resurrection stories, has got many themes: the failed fishing trip, the initial inability of Peter to recognise the risen Jesus, the miracle of the 153 fish and the simple, powerful reassuring words of Jesus to his confused disciples: "**Come and have breakfast.**" We can all find ourselves a place in this Gospel story, as we continue to wonder at the resurrection. After

the resurrection, Jesus revealed himself once again on the Sea of Galilee ("Tiberius,"). In the half-light of the morning, he called to his followers from the shore, telling them to cast their nets to the right side of the boat. Although they'd fished all night and caught nothing, their obedience to Jesus brought forth a great number of fish. John was the first to understand the meaning of this sign and cried out, "It is the Lord!" Peter was the first to act, swimming and dragging the heavily laden net to shore. Although the net held a great catch of fish, it was not torn. The unbroken net was a symbol of the future mission of the Church to bring souls to Christ. Afterward, Peter was given a three-fold opportunity to publicly profess his devotion in reparation for his three denials. For each declaration of faith, the Risen Lord commanded Peter to feed the flock, the Christian community. Peter, the Church's future shepherd, would lay down his life for the sake of the flock as Jesus did.

Today's Readings:

Acts 5:27-32. 40-41: The apostles are proud to give witness to their risen Lord and suffer humiliation for the sake of his name.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM: I will praise you, Lord, you have rescued me.

Apocalypse 5:11-14: All living beings give praise to the Lamb of God.

John 21:1-19: The love of God is shown in the love we show to people in need.

Pray for those who have died, and whose Anniversaries occur around this time, also, please pray for the sick, and, remember the People of Ukraine.

MARY'S MONTH: The month of May, with its flowers,



was adopted by the Church in the eighteenth century as a celebration of the flowering of Mary's spirituality. In Isaiah's prophecy of the Virgin birth of the Messiah, the figure of the Blossoming Rod, or Root of Jesse, the flower symbolism of Mary was extended by the Church Fathers, and, in the

liturgy, by applying to her the flower figures of the Bible books: Canticles, Wisdom, Proverbs and Sirach. In the medieval period, the rose was adopted as the flower symbol of the Virgin Birth, as expressed in Dante's phrase, 'The Rose wherein the Divine Word was made flesh,' and depicted in the rose windows of the great gothic cathedrals, from which came the Christmas carol, 'Lo, How a Rose 'ere Blooming.' Also, with the spread of the Franciscan love of nature, the rose of the fields, waysides and gardens, came to be seen as symbols of Mary.
