Basking in the light and joy of Easter, the risen Christ proclaims, "Peace be with you". We are sent out as God's children to witness to the resurrection by our actions, more than our words.

Today's Reading

Acts 4:32-35: The apostles continued to testify to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus with great power.


Response to the Psalm: Give thanks to the Lord for he is good, for his love has no end.

1 John 5:1-6: We can be sure that we love God's children if we love God himself and do what he has commanded us.

John 20:19-31: Jesus said to Thomas, "You believe because you can see me. Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe."

"Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed".

On the evening of the resurrection, the disciples were gathered in fear behind locked doors. They were overjoyed when the Risen Lord appeared in their midst with a greeting of "peace" (Hebrew, Shalom). Just as God breathed life into Adam, the first living being, the Son of God breathed the life-giving Spirit upon his disciples, sending them forth with the power to forgive sins. Thomas (called Didymus, meaning "twin") was absent on this occasion and he refused to believe their testimony. His defiant words "unless I see" came from one who knew Jesus as an intimate friend. A week later, the Risen Christ appeared again, and this time Thomas was present. When Thomas touched Christ's wounds, he declared Jesus to be his "Lord and God." Jesus told Thomas that those



who believed in faith were more blessed than those who needed visible proof.

Pray for those who have died, and those whose Anniversaries occur around this time, also, please pray for the sick, and, remember the People of Ukraine, and all countries where there is war. We also pray for peace in the Holy Land

The Second Sunday of Easter is also known as Divine Mercy Sunday. We reflect today on the profound message of mercy and forgiveness that flows from the heart of our compassionate God.

In today's Gospel, we encounter the disciples locked away in fear, hiding after the crucifixion of Jesus. Despite their doubts and uncertainties, Jesus appears among them, offering peace and breathing new life into their spirits. His first words to them are "Peace be with you," words that echo through the centuries, reaching us in our own moments of fear and doubt.

Divine Mercy Sunday invites us to contemplate the boundless mercy of God, a mercy that knows no limits and embraces everyone who looks for forgiveness and reconciliation. It is a day to rejoice in the knowledge that no sin is too great for God's mercy to reach, no wound too deep for his love to mend.

Let us pray for the grace to be instruments of mercy in our families, in our communities, and beyond, following the example of our Risen Lord who conquered sin and death and offers us the gift of eternal life.

Through the encounter in today's Gospel, we are reminded that doubt is not the opposite of faith but rather a part of the journey towards deeper belief. Jesus meets us in our doubts, offering us his wounded hands and side, inviting us to trust in his love and his infinite mercy.
