4th SUNDAY OF ADVENT – 17th & 18th DECEMBER 2022

We come to St Francis Church today to listen to the Good News – of God with us – just as the people who went before us heard the Good News. We also come to be thankful or the Lords continuing presence - and to take him out to the world.

Today's Readings

Isaiah 7:10-14: The people should not put God to the test, but they will be given a miraculous sign.

Romans 1: 1-7: The promise of God is revealed in God's Son and it is his Good News that the faithful are to take out to the world.

Matthew 1:18-24: The world is turned upside down but we need not be fearful.

Response to the Psalm:

Let the Lord enter! He is the King of glory.

"Behold, the virgin shall be with child and bear a son, and they shall name him Emmanuel".

Matthew's gospel has the most distinctive Jewish characteristics of all the Gospels. He begins with a genealogy to show that Jesus shared ancestry with the people of Israel. Jesus was the long-anticipated "Messiah, the son of David, the son of Abraham". Luke's nativity is told from Mary's perspective, Matthew's point of view was Joseph, to whom she was betrothed. Betrothal was a solemn commitment, which lasted a full year, and could only be terminated by divorce. Before Mary and Joseph lived together as husband and wife, she was found to be with child. Joseph was a "righteous man" who followed the Mosaic Law, but he decided to divorce her quietly as he was unwilling to expose her to public disgrace (death by stoning (Deut 22:23-24).





Just as the patriarch Joseph received divine communication through dreams (Gen 37:5-9), the angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream. He was told not to fear taking Mary as his wife as the child had been conceived through God's Spirit. Joseph accepted guardianship of the child who would be named Jesus ("Yahweh saves"). Through Joseph, Jesus would bear the messianic title "Son of David". Jesus is "Emmanuel," which means, "God with us" the incarnate Son of God who dwells with his people to the end of the age.

WINTER

In the northern hemisphere, winter begins on the day the Sun is farthest south (on **December 21st or 22nd).** This waning of the sun is known as the Winter Solstice. The

Romans celebrated "The Feast of the Invincible Sun" on this day. For Christians, Christ is the Invincible Son. In the Southern hemisphere, winter and summer solstices are exchanged so that the winter solstice is the day on which the Sun is farthest north.



The O ANTIPHONS, December 17-23

The seven antiphons that are recited (or chanted) preceding the Magnificat during Vespers of the Liturgy of the Hours. They cover the special period of Advent preparation known as the Octave before Christmas, Dec. 17-23, with Dec. 24 being Christmas Eve and Vespers for that evening being for Christmas 'O Emanuel'. The Gospel Acclamation for weekday Masses from 17th to 23rd December use the same text (without the 'O's'!

Each one highlights a title for the Messiah:



O Sapientia (O Wisdom),
O Adonai (O Sacred Lord),
O Radix Jesse (O Flower of Jesse's Stem),
O Clavis David (O Key of David),
O Oriens (O Radiant Dawn),
O Rex Gentium (O King of all Nations),
O Emmanuel.

Each one refers to the prophecy of Isaiah about the coming of the Messiah. The "O Antiphons" were first used by the Church in the 8th and 9th centuries. In these "O Antiphons" the Church expresses her longing for the coming of the Messiah. The Advent hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" is based on the "O Antiphons."
